Julius Ihonvbere is presently Program Officer for "Pluralism and Participation" in the Governance and Civil Society Unit, Peace and Social Justice Program at the Ford Foundation in New York. He is on leave from his academic post as Professor of Government, University of Texas-Austin. Dr. Ihonvbere also serves on the Executive of the Association of Third World Studies and on the Editorial Board of the Journal of Third World Studies.

Dr. Ihonvbere is an award-winning academic and human rights activist. He is the recipient of the First Mario Zamora Memorial Award from the Association of Third World Studies. He is the author of *Labor, Capital and the State in Nigeria's Oil Industry* (1998); *Economic Crisis, Civil Society and Democratization: The Case of Zambia* (Africa World Press 1996); and *Nigeria: The Politics of Adjustment and Democracy* (Transaction 1994).

Dr. Ihonvbere is also the co-author of many books including (with Timothy Shaw of Dalhousie), *The Illusions of Power: Nigeria in Transition* (Africa World Press 1998); and (with John Mbaku), *Multiparty Democracy and Political Change: Constraints to Democratization in Africa* (1998). Among his forthcoming works is the book: *Fragile Democracies: The Legacy of Authoritarianism in Africa*.
