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From Rwanda to St. Stephen's: A Journey of Learning and Healing

Rev. Emmanuel Gatera is a DMin student from Kigali in Rwanda. He enrolled in the program in 2008. On his recent second trip to Canada and to St. Stephen's College, he participated in doctoral program courses.

Emmanuel is the pastor for Kimironko Anglican congregation in Kigali as well as the General Secretary of the Anglican Church in Rwanda.



Emmanuel learned about St. Stephen's College from Rev. Brian Pearson, an Anglican pastor in Calgary and a friend for many years.

"I had a longtime vision to train in counselling to contribute to the healing of my people – post-genocide effects, trauma, anxiety, anger, lack of hope," Emmanuel explained in a recent interview.

He likes the St. Stephen's College formula which allows him to come for two to three months for academic work and then go home to serve his church, congregation and his family. When he is away, he misses his family very much: he and his wife Athanasie have three daughters and a son, ages seven through seventeen.

Emmanuel says his experience in Canada is working out as he had hoped. "When I chose to come, I was told by various people that I may not fit, but when I came, I found the College an ecumenical place where everyone is able to have his own views and that diverse views are acceptable".

"I lived in exile for 30 years. In 1963 the wars started and we fled in January 1964. I left with my dad, my mother, my two sisters and my brother. My dad died later from the effects of torture. We lived in the refugee camps in Burundi for five years; then we were in Uganda in camps until 1993. Uganda is where I studied theology."

"In the camps we were deprived of many things so I am learning a lot about myself, discovering myself. I rely on the theories to help me capture the development I missed, become a kid sometimes."

When asked where he was at in his recapturing of childhood, he responded with a wide grin, "Oh, about 8!"

It is both a pleasure and an education for us at the College to have Emmanuel studying here. The College community is encouraged to watch for Emmanuel's return next year and to make time to hear more about his life's journey.

Close Encounters at St. Stephen's

Former Dean shares his vision during a memorable visit

Dr. Bill Close, former Dean of St. Stephen's College and also the Director of the DMin Program at the College for two decades, visited the College on Wednesday, May 20 for a meet and greet with members of the College community. Bill left St. Stephen's in 1997 to become President of the Atlantic School of Theology in Halifax. Those who came to visit with Bill appreciated hearing about his wife, Doris, who died recently.

We were touched by Bill's willingness to share his thoughts and feelings about his last few months with Doris, whom he described as "a woman of faith and a woman of courage". We were captivated by Bill's description of the music at Doris' service which concluded with Handel's *Amen* from *The Messiah*. Bill

invited us to imagine the *Amen* as portraying the stars going out at the end of Creation praising God and singing "It has been very good".

Our thoughts and prayers continue to be with Bill as he adjusts to life without his "star". Bill admitted that his heart is still

in St. Stephen's because the personality of the College remains from his time here but in a different form. He talked about the deep relationships with people at the College and the willingness of the College to experiment.

An obvious visionary, Bill spoke of the need to "leap forward" and it was noted that Bill ran the first online course here at the College at a time when that was a cutting edge initiative.

In the conversation, Bill went on to state that, for example, "preserving the past in an historical building can't be the end of the matter, or being frozen in a program; you need to go as far past the vision of others as you can".

Those are inspiring words to hear as the College enters its second century.

We are looking forward to future visits from Bill as we hope he includes Edmonton and the College in his retirement travel plans.
