<u>Course Description</u>: Our behavior is inherently socio-cultural. PSYCO 305 presents an introduction to a number of topics in experimental cultural psychology, as well as research relevant to some of the major problems in this field. We will cover the issues of culture & the self, culture & motivation, culture & cognition, and culture & perception. We also discuss various issues of our multi-cultural society.

Prerequisites: PSYCO 104, PSYCO 105, and at least one 200 level PSYCO courses.

Course Structure: In my lectures I will be introducing, clarifying, and elaborating on material related to the course, some of it in the text and some not. Lecture time is limited. *You will be responsible for a great deal of the information in the text on your own*. Just because I haven't lectured on it doesn't mean you aren't responsible for it.

Evaluations:

Class Participation & Discussion: To better understand materials, the class attendance is mandatory. We will have 20-30 min group discussion sessions in some of the class. Their active participation in discussion (speak up in class) will be also counted as bonus points.

Exams. Exams will be based on the textbook, assigned articles, and lecture materials. Each Midterm exam will include only the readings and the lecture material covered immediately preceding that exam, which is worth 30% of the total grade. The final exam *will be cumulative for all lecture materials from the beginning of the course.* You will have 2 hours to complete the final, which is worth 35% of the total grade. The format of the exam is open-ended questions, multiple-choice questions, and short essay questions.

The final grade will be based on three exams and the bonus points.
