My favourite experience as a student was taking Native Studies 372 Métis Politics with Professor Harold Robinson. Initially, I knew very little about Métis politics and felt intimidated to engage in discussion as my classmates were very knowledgeable in this field of study. My teacher and classmates helped me gain the knowledge and confidence to engage in class

discussions. By the end of the course, I became knowledgeable in Métis politics and capable of forming my own opinions. I have never taken a course before with such thoughtful and intelligent classmates and teachers. I am grateful to have the opportunity to be in the Faculty of Native Studies because of these kinds of experiences that will stick with me for the rest of my life."

Self-Declare as Indigenous

Self-declaring as an Indigenous person and student at the U of A is important. Whether you're from a First Nation, Métis or Inuit community, or you're an urban Indigenous person, self-declaring can provide unique opportunities for support, events, funding and more.

First Peoples' House (FPH)

A dedicated space for the Indigenous student community on North Campus, FPH honours the Indigenous worldview of education as a continuous Ceremony by respecting and supporting First Nations, Métis, Inuit and non-status Indigenous students.

Scholarships and Awards

The University of Alberta administers more than \$46 million in undergraduate financial support each year. Many faculties and departments offer awards and scholarships specifically for Indigenous students. Explore your options and apply at uab.ca/awards

ADMISSION-BASED

Scholarships you don't even have to apply for. Eligibility for these scholarships is based on your admission average at the time of your admission offer.

Indigenous Entrance Scholarship

Self-declaring First Nations, Métis or Inuit students with an average of 80%+ will receive up to \$1,500.

APPLICATION-BASED

Remember, just one application assesses you for everything! We match you to scholarships and awards based on your background, experiences, academics and interests. The deadline is January 10, 2024, and you must apply to your program first.

Indigenous Careers Award

Self-declaring First Nations, Métis or Inuit students who are residents of Alberta completing degrees in programs with high-demand career outcomes will receive \$2,000 per semester. Apply by October 13, 2024.

First Nations, Métis and Inuit Student Awards

Various awards of up to \$5,000 are available. Apply by **October 13, 2024.**

Turtle Spirit Pathway Award for First Nations, Métis and Inuit Students

Students new to post-secondary who have demonstrated financial challenges and barriers to attending will receive up to \$8,000 per year.



Find Yourself...Here

NORTH CAMPUS

The University of Alberta is located in the heart of amiskwacîwâskahikan (Edmonton) in Treaty 6 Territory, one of the fastest growing urban areas for Indigenous Peoples on Turtle Island (Canada). Steps away from campus is our breathtaking river valley, a traditional meeting place for many Indigenous Peoples since time immemorial.

THERE ARE SEVERAL WAYS TO COME TO THE U OF A

Direct Entry (from High School)

For direct entry, you will need to present competitive grades in five core academic 30-level courses, including English Language Arts 30-1 plus four other core courses. The additional four core courses vary by program.

The application deadline for direct entry is **March 1, 2024.**

Transfer Students

If you are transferring from another post-secondary institution, you will need to consult your faculty of interest for full admission details. As a transfer applicant, you will be evaluated on both your high school and post-secondary coursework. Once admitted, you will automatically be evaluated for transfer credit. If you are a transfer student from an Indigenous Post-Secondary Institution (IPSI), contact an Indigenous recruiter for more information at indigenous@ualberta.ca

Mature Students

To qualify for admission as a mature (or non-matriculated) student, you must be 21 or older as of September 1 in the year you wish to attend and not have completed any previous post-secondary schooling. uab.ca/nma

Transition Year Program

The Transition Year Program (TYP), offered through First Peoples' House at our North Campus in Edmonton, is a one-year university access program designed for students who may not be prepared to enter a faculty through a direct entry route. TYP is a full-time, Open Studies program that partners with nine faculties. Upon completion, you will be eligible to transfer 15-24* credits into the participating faculty of your choice. uab.ca/typ

Deadline to apply (fall): May 1, 2024 *All Faculties

Deadline to apply (winter): October 1, 2024 *Arts and Native Studies

- 1 BSc in Human Ecology: Biology 30 or Chemistry 30 is required and Math 30-2 or Math 30-1
- 2 Group A (Humanities): Social Studies 30-1, Aboriginal Studies 30, or a 30-level language other than English; Group B (Fine Arts): Art 30, Dama 30, and Additional Fine Arts courses may be considered; or Group C (Math and Science): Chemistry 30, Biology 30, Physics 30, Science 30, Math 30-1, 30-2, or Math 31.
- 3 Biology 30 recommended

No Fee to Apply To TYP

Initially, there is no fee to apply to TYP. However, the TYP application is a more involved process than a direct entry application requiring additional supporting documents. Indigenous

applicants are encouraged to start the application early. The application fee will be required once an admission offer is made and accepted. Apply online at uab.ca/typ
