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No system of control can ever be totalizing, can account for every circumstance of the everyday.

There are cracks, or interstices, in the discourses, spaces, and institutions of the urban. This

research explores the phenomenon of interstitiality, of that which exists in the interstices: it

seeks to understand how interstitiality occurs, its connection to informal/formal relations, and

its implications for planning practice. Whereas other spatial research has focused on one aspect

of interstitiality and discussed it as exclusively positive or negative, this research addresses both

the resilience and vulnerability inherent in interstitiality. Through the story of an urban garden

in Edmonton, this research identifies a triple dialectic of interstitiality: discursive, spatial, and

institutional interstices interact with each other to create the overall condition of interstitiality.

This research provides insights into how interstitiality functions within informal and formal co-

evolution, and how this informs broader spatial governance.
