Our Masters program provides the ability to establish relationships with top Canadian Nursing Faculty, including award winning researchers and teachers, and can provide you:

Connected Curriculum

- Inquiry and research are intimately linked with learning and practice.
- Connects students to each other, faculty, faculty research, questions and issues in nursing, and to diverse ways of knowing and inquiring.
- Students engage in “**Community of Inquiry**” courses that develop skills to ask good questions, analyze information and current literature, and utilize a structured, guided, and independent approach to research and inquiries. These courses build towards the completion of capstone or research projects.

Program Structure

Time to Completion:	20 months (full-time) to 3 years (part-time)
Delivery:	Course-based <u>or</u> Thesis-based
Course work:	Part-time or full-time, flexible scheduling (daytime/evening, blended/hybrid classes). Students must be available to participate in regularly scheduled classes and seminars
Opportunities:	Students select one of four Advanced Focus areas of study in Education, Leadership, Research, or Clinical (leads to licensing as a Nurse Practitioner)
