I participated in the summer program, so basically I took two courses, French in the morning and another elective course "World Class Museum", in my case, in the afternoon. A few field trips were included and also counted for credits.

ECTS credit system is used in France, and 6 ECTS credits are equivalent to 3 credits at the U of A, I believe.

It was really fun and I liked the elective course, most of which classes were taught in different museums so that you do not just sit in the classroom and take notes. There is moderate amount of homework and easy exams.
