MANDATORY SAFETY PROTOCOLS

Student Life During COVID-19

This [10-minute online course](#) is required for all students participating in in-person learning or research activities on campus this Spring and Summer term. Before your first day on campus, you will need to submit your course completion certificate to your instructor(s)/supervisor(s).

Daily self health checks

Each day, before coming to campus, complete the [daily checklist](#) provided by Alberta Health Services. If you answer “yes,” to any of the screening questions, stay home and complete the [COVID-19 Self-Assessment for Albertans](#).

Contact tracing on campus

Know how to best contact your supervisor or instructor in a timely fashion. If you have tested positive for COVID-19 or are legally required to isolate AND have been on campus in the last 14 days, you will need to contact your supervisor, instructor or activity coordinator as soon as possible. To ensure you receive timely notifications of any potential exposures on campus, check your ualberta.ca inbox regularly. **More info:** [Contact tracing on campus](#)



Masks

Non-medical or fabric masks are required on all U of A campuses; inside buildings and in all common areas. There are [several places to get masks](#), both on and off campus. **More info:** [U of A Mandatory Mask Policy](#)

Physical distancing

Whether you are in a classroom, studio, office, or lab, you must remain at least two metres from others even when wearing a mask. When the environment makes this impossible, other measures must be in place. This may include barriers, minimizing the amount of time doing these activities, **and** wearing masks at all times.



Safety measures compliance

The university expects all members of its community and visitors to its campuses to know current safety protocols [before coming to campus](#). While our focus is on educating and informing community members of the safety measures needed to keep our community safe, violations of safety measures can result in action under existing university policies, such as the Code of Student Behavior, or provincial fines.
