Course Description, Objectives and Expected Learning Outcomes:

This course will teach basic critical tools for textual analysis and essay writing as well as assist students in developing their own reading and writing strategies.

Students will read French and Francophone texts from a variety of genres, periods, and traditions. At the end of this course, successful students will be able to draw nuanced conclusions about complex pieces of writing, identify themes and patterns in what they read, and express and justify their conclusions about texts written in French.

Explanatory Notes on Assignments:

Participation and attendance: You are expected to attend and actively participate in class. This includes:

1. Thoroughly preparing all work assigned for each class session
2. Contributing actively to class discussion and activities. This includes not only regularly sharing your own thoughts about what we read, but also listening attentively and responding to your classmates' ideas.

Important note: Disruptive behaviour in class is a sign of disrespect both to the instructor and to your fellow students, and will not be tolerated. Activities such as chatting, surfing the Internet, using or frequently checking your phone, studying for another class, etc. will result in a low participation grade.

Presentations: Students will give short presentations in class, with a partner or in small groups. Detailed instructions and grading criteria will be provided by the professor ahead of time.

Short papers: each student will prepare two short essays over the course of the semester of approximately 4-5 pages each. Detailed instructions and grading criteria will be provided by the professor ahead of time.
