Explore your passion for advancing health through research that impacts individuals, communities and health systems.


Education excellence

Program Structure

Time to Completion: 4-6 years

Course work: Up to 3 courses per semester, completed within the first 2 years. Flexible

scheduling (daytime/evening, blended/hybrid classes). Students must be able to

participate in regularly scheduled classes and seminars.

Opportunities: Work as teaching/research assistants to gain experience and funding support

Supervisor: Students work closely with a supervisor who has expertise in research

topic/methods

Dissertation: Traditional or *Paper-Based Dissertation

*Students complete a minimum of 3 publishable papers
