Message from the Department

As we draw close to the end of another academic year, it is with great pride and enthusiasm that we share with you the accomplishments and milestones of the Department of Occupational Therapy at the University of Alberta.

This year has been a testament to the growth and recognition of our program. We have welcomed an increased number of students, now totalling 130, due to the Government of Saskatchewan funding an additional five student seats for our September 2023 cohort. This expansion reflects the growing demand for occupational therapists. We are also excited to be part of a program expansion in 2024, with the Government of Alberta's approval to establish a satellite program at the Augustana campus in

Camrose. This initiative will add 15 new seats each for occupational therapy, physiotherapy and communication sciences and disorders, marking a significant expansion of our rehabilitation presence in rural Alberta. Our first Augustana cohort will be admitted in September 2024, and preparations are well underway, including the submission of a substantive changes report to the CAOT Academic Credentialing Council.

Our main objective this year has been to revise the curriculum by implementing our new "Education for Capabilities" framework. The redeveloped curriculum is scheduled to launch with the September 2024 cohort. These changes are in line with the new Competencies for Occupational Therapists in Canada (CAOT 2021), and they are crucial to maintaining our commitment to excellence and relevance in OT education.

As part of our ongoing commitment to promoting diversity, equity and inclusion, we have updated our admissions process for 2024. This change aims to better support students from underrepresented and marginalized

communities in their application process. We believe this initiative is a positive step towards improving the diversity and inclusivity of our student population.

The department's outstanding research productivity has resulted in more than 50 peer-reviewed publications and secured nearly \$8.4 million in funding, reinforcing our significant contribution to the occupational therapy field.

This year, we celebrated Occupational Therapy Month with community-oriented activities, including collaborating with Canadian Blood Services as part of WFOT Global Service Day, a "Light up the Bridge for OT" social event at Kinsmen Park, and providing Wellness Centre services at the 2023 National Gathering of Elders. These events fostered camaraderie and raised awareness about occupational therapy within and beyond our program.

Additionally, we have partnered with Boyle Street Community Services for a joint OT position, highlighting our commitment to community integration and student placement opportunities. And, after significant lobbying by our department, the University of Alberta Dean of Students has created a full-time occupational therapist position to support student academic success across campus, highlighting the growing recognition of our profession's value across a growing number of diverse practice and service settings.

These achievements underscore our dedication to advancing occupational therapy and our commitment to our students, faculty and the broader community. We eagerly look forward to continuing this journey of growth and innovation.




Figure 2: Competencies, competence and capability




Figure 3: MScOT Education for Capability Model

Through critical, reflective, creative and social inquiry, students develop scholarly practice habits necessary for continuous learning and professional growth.

Our approach is responsive to the critiques of conventional higher education, advocating for a multidimensional understanding of occupational therapy that considers professional, moral and political dimensions. Students are equipped with capabilities such as adaptive flexibility, creative problemsolving and reflective practice, ensuring they are prepared to deliver services that respond to the dynamic nature of health care and society. Our curriculum is about teaching competence and nurturing capable practitioners who can think critically, act wisely and advocate for change in a diverse world.

COLLABORATIVE CARE

In April 2023, students participated in a collaborative learning activity with the Therapy Assistant programs at Norquest College and the Southern Alberta Institute of Technology (SAIT).

BOYLE STREET COLLABORATION

The OT department has established a joint position in collaboration with Boyle Street Community Services. As a U of A OT department community liaison, this position will enable the department to establish key connections with Edmonton's inner-city agencies, coordinate student placements, and contribute to the MScOT program.

DEAN OF STUDENTS COLLABORATION

The Office of the Dean of Students is recruiting a full-time Occupational Therapist. This position will be based in UAlberta's Student Wellness Center and Accessibility Resources and provide an additional 8 mental health placements per year.
