Scholar's Hub @ Home--Why stories linger in our minds: Using stories to probe human memory and thought

<u>Speaker</u>: Dr. Bellana Buddhika, Assistant Professor, Department of Psychology, Glendon College

<u>Short overview</u>: A good book is not only characterized by the reader's experience while in the midst of reading it. In fact, a good book is marked by its ability to shape the content of our thoughts for hours, sometimes days, after putting it down. This presentation will examine the idea that stories have a propensity to linger in your mind. We will look at how this phenomenon can be quantified in the laboratory and what it might reveal about how our memory system works.
