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CONTEXT

Definitions

Gender-based violence (GBV): violence perpetrated against people because of their gender, gender expression, gender identity, or perceived gender. It is based on gender norms and unequal power dynamics (Government of Canada, 2022).

Sexual violence: any form of sexual act (performed, attempted, threatened, unwanted comments or advances) performed without consent (Government of Canada, 2022).

Sexual and Gender-Based Violence in Alberta

Sexual and gender-based violence (SGVB) impacts all Albertans. About 1.8 million, or just over 2 in 5 Albertans have experienced some form of SGBV in their lifetime (Association of Alberta Sexual Assault Services (AASAS), 2020). There is an increased risk of SGBV for women and girls ages 15-24, persons with disabilities and LGBTQ+ individuals (Government of Alberta, n.d.). AASAS reports that 87% of sexual violence police reports are completed by women, and gay and bisexual individuals are six times more likely to self-report experiencing SGBV (AASAS, 2020).

Survey Context

SGBV is prevalent throughout Canada but is underreported among post-secondary students (Government of Canada, 2021).

The Alberta Post-Secondary Student Sexual and Gender-Based Violence Survey was made possible by funding from the Government of Alberta.

The survey had several goals, including developing an understanding of:

- Attitudes and beliefs about SGBV and consent
- Perceptions of the institution landscape regarding SGBV
- Awareness and knowledge of institution supports
- Experiences of SGBV

Results from the survey will help the Ministry of Advanced Education and Albertan post-secondary institutions enact meaningful and effective policies and programs that help prevent SGBV and promote gender equality.



METHODOLOGY



University of Alberta RESULTS

Questionnaire Design

 The Campus Climate Survey on Sexual and Gender-based Violence Working Group, with representatives from the 26 publicly funded post-secondary institutions in Alberta, developed the survey questionnaire.

Data Collection

- Leger Marketing Alberta (Leger) facilitated the data collection.
- Leger surveyed students from 26 publicly funded post-secondary institutions in Alberta from January 30, 2023 – March 16, 2023.
- The survey received a total of 12,948 completes (overall), representing a response rate of 5.8%.
- The survey received a total of 2,486 completes among University of Alberta students, representing a response rate of 11.3%.
- Email invitations to complete the survey were sent to each student where valid
 email addresses were available. The email links were individualized (i.e., with
 unique IDs) to prevent duplicate responses. This also permitted students to stopand-start the survey at their own convenience, picking up where they last left off.

Consent, Privacy and FOIP

Students were asked for consent before completing the survey. Students were also provided a FOIP statement, and informed that no responses would be personally identifiable, and responses would only be analyzed in aggregate.

Reporting and Analysis

- The findings in this report focus on the results for University of Alberta.
- Throughout the report statistical differences have been noted between subsegments and the total where relevant. These differences are noted in the appendix where % is significantly higher than % at a 95% confidence interval.
- Due to the targeted nature of the sampling approach, data are unweighted.


Recontact Data

 Due to a programming error, 683 students of the total completes (12,948) were recontacted to redo questions 37-43. Responses from the 123 students that responded to the request for recontact were added into the total data, but the additional 560 were removed from those questions only.













Overall, University of Alberta students have attitudes and beliefs that are well aligned with important realities when it comes to SGBV. Students overwhelmingly agree that people of all genders can experience sexual assault (96%) and that sexual harassment can cause significant harm (95%).





There is strong disagreement that if an individual does not physically fight back, it is not sexual assault (90%). Areas where there are the most neutrality include more contentiously debated elements of SGBV including drinking, sexual promiscuity, being too easily offended by jokes, and misunderstandings around consent.




Disagreement with statements related to sexual coercion are slightly lower among men and students over 35 compared to University of Alberta average.

The majority of University of Alberta students agree it is important to let their sexual partner know what they want and feel comfortable with and ask them what they want sexually. A lesser majority agree that they believe it would not hurt their relationship with their sexual partner if they were to say no to sex and that it is important to talk about their sexual needs and desires with their partner often.

In general, communication with sexual partners about needs and desires appears to be more valued by women and/or students between the ages of 25 and 34 years.



When it comes to deciding to ask for help if a student were to experience SGBV, knowing that they would be treated with respect, dignity, and compassion garners the greatest proportion of top-3 mentions. This is followed by feeling that telling someone would contribute to keeping others safe and that the person they told would believe them.



Responses less than 4% are not labelled.

When it comes to making the decision to ask for help, being believed and that would contribute to keeping the student safe is considerably more important among women, while disclosure confidentiality is more important for students who identify as men.

The vast majority of University of Alberta students agree that people who have experienced SGBV should be able to access support from University of Alberta. Opinions are divided when it comes to those who have committed SGBV having access to support. Those ages 25 years and over are most likely to believe that people who have committed SGBV should be able to access support.



University of Alberta students who identify as men are less likely to agree on the responsibility of everyone to prevent SGBV and show more confidence that students are educated about sexual and gender-based violence. Gender diverse students have the lowest opinions about the school's reactions and investigations into incidents of SGBV. Compared to other institutions, University of Alberta receives higher ratings in SGBV as a societal problem as well as service, but received lower ratings in school doing all it can to protect students from SGBV.











































% Yes by Most Recent Form of SGBV*







Most University of Alberta students who disclosed their experience of SGBV to the university agree the person they reached out to believed in what they said. Contribution to a safe environment for students to discuss their experiences and the university's concern about the problem of SGBV and are well recognized, aligning with students' top considerations when they decide whether to seek support. The institutional response to SGBV disclosures, such as status updates and academic accommodations represents an area of potential improvement.














