### MISSION OF THE CENTRE

Prince Takamado Japan Centre for Teaching and Research continues its efforts to fulfill the following revised mandate:

### SUMMARY

During the 2016-2017 academic year, PTJC took several new initiatives academically and administratively, taking into account the recommendations made by the unit review that took place in May and June 2016. Our goal was to strengthen its research profile and governing structure. At the administrative level, it established an administrative board, advisory council, and research committee. It also adopted a number of effective measures in administration and promotion.

Academically, the centre has completed its programs, including the Japan-Canada Academic Consortium Student Forum at the University of British Columbia, which dealt with immigration and refugee issues. The highlight of this year was three guest lectures

by Japanese scholars, which were made possible with the collaboration with the Centre for Japanese Research at the University of Alberta and Japan Foundation Toronto. PTJC also hosted a seminar attended by major Asianists on the University of Alberta campus. It was able to hire two graduate research assistants, and continued offering several undergraduate scholarships in engineering.

For community outreach, PTJC organized the Alberta District Japanese Speech Contest, which was attended our major supporters such as a representative from Mitsui Canada and the Consul-General of Japan in Calgary. It also offered Japanese language professors and students a place for networking across seven universities in Alberta and Saskatchewan.

Event Details:

July 3, 2016: Japanese Language Proficiency Test (JLPT)

This was the fifth year the University of Alberta hosted a summer edition of the JLPT. As the sole institution that organizes this exam in summer, we received 127 applicants from many parts of North America. It provided both high school and university students with a great opportunity to visit the U of A campus. At the same time, it offered U of A students who took courses as the Department of East Asian Studies a chance to get qualifications to search jobs in Japanese industries and to study in Japanese universities.

November 4, 2016: The Japan Foundation Toronto and the Japan Studies Association of Canada Annual Lecture Series I

This year, PTJC was chosen as the host for the annual JF/JSAC lecture series. Professor Takamichi Mito (Kwansei Gakuin University) gave a lecture entitled "Omotenashi (Quality Service) as a Source of Japan's Soft Power and its Transferability to Canada." He discussed how Omotenashi became a widely-used term by the media and the government in Japan, especially in the conjunction of the Olympic campaign. From the perspective of political economy, he assessed the economic value of Omotenashi. After his lecture, the audience joined in the discussion.

November 25, 2016: Pan Project

PTJC co-sponsored the Pan Project, a musical residency on the topic of interculturalism in East Asian music. Dr. Jeff Roberts, the Department of East Asian Studies and the Department of Music, organized this event. One of the musicians was Kaoru Watanabe, an internationally know Japanese flute player and taiko drummer. More than 200 people participated in the event.

November 26, 2016: Japanese Cultural Festival / Research Display

PTJC co-sponsored the research display of the Japanese Cultural Festival, organized by the East Asian Studies Undergraduate Students' Association, Japanese exchange students, and others including the past JACAC from participants. The event had a research exhibit, which introduced academic profiles of our faculty members and graduate students. It also featured a number of information sessions on studying and working in Japan. More than 450 people participated in the event.

December 2, 2016: Japanese Language Proficiency Test (JLPT)

PTJC organized the winter edition of the Japanese Language Proficiency Test. 107 people applied for the test. It was the largest number of applicants that we have ever had in Winter, suggesting the increasing interest in Japanese language at the University of Alberta.

January 2016: Princess Takamado Essay Contest

The themes of the competition were:

- 1. Write a letter to Canadian Prime Minister Justin Trudeau. In the letter, describe what initiatives you'd like for him to take in the economic and political cooperation in the Asia-Pacific region.
- 2. Should Japanese university students engage in study abroad? How can this experience be beneficial for Japan-Canada collaboration?

3. Recently, Japanese popular culture has made a great impact in the world mainly through games, pop-music, and manga. How can culture be used to build ties between Japan, Canada, and other countries?

The winner of this year's contest was Yuni Iwasaki from Seian University of Arts and Design. The winner will be taking part in the English Language School at the Faculty of Extension, University of Alberta.

February 9, 2017: The Japan Foundation Toronto and the Japan Studies Association of Canada Annual Lecture Series II

Professor Masahiro Hamashita gave a lecture on the history of Japanese women's education. He discussed how some Japanese female figures were promoted with favourable images while others were not in Modern Japan. While they were often subordinated in the male dominant society, he argued that many women found a way to address their rights and interests tactically, using their public images.

### February 18-26, 2017: Japan-Canada Academic Consortium Student Forum

The Japan-Canada Academic Consortium held its eighth annual Student Forum at the University of British Columbia in Vancouver. With the support from the Mitsubishi UFJ Foundation, the Consulate-General of Japan in Vancouver, the Japan Foundation, and the University of British Columbia, Japan Student Services Organization and JACAC membership universities, we had a successful forum. Fourteen students participants from the consortium's ten Canadian universities joined fourteen students from the eleven Japanese universities to discuss the issues of immigration and national borders. Through a week of sessions – lectures, a panel discussion and group work—at UBC and field work, students produced final presentations.

This year's forum dealt with a very topical question, as immigration and refugee issues appeared in world headlines throughout the year. Its participants were culturally and academically diverse, many were immigrants themselves. We also had an aboriginal student from the University of Manitoba and an African refugee student from the U of A, who added great insights to the discussion. All students had stellar academic records, thereby contributing to the high quality of the conference. The Consul-General of Japan in Vancouver generously hosted the reception where participants had an opportunity to hear her experience as a diplomat. As the Canadian Secretariat for the Japan-Canada Academic Consortium, PTJC is looking forward to continuing this forum next year, which will take place at J. F. Oberlin University in Tokyo.

March 3, 2017: Department of East Asian Studies Lecture Series

PTJC sponsored a lecture by Professor Ben Whaley, University of Calgary for the Department of East Asian Studies. He gave a very insightful lecture on Japanese that examines race relations and postcolonial discourses in Tezuka Osamu's medical manga, Kirihito sanka. The talk was attended by students and faculty members beyond the

Department of East Asian Studies. Dr. Whaley also had a meeting session with graduate students.

March 4, 2017: Alberta District Japanese Speech Contest

The PTJC organized the 26<sup>th</sup> Alberta Japanese District Speech Contest at the University of Alberta. This event attracted a lot of public interest, and had approximately 100 participants. It received financial support from the Consulate-General of Japan in Calgary, Alberta Japanese Business Association, and Mitsui Canada Foundation. Consul-General Kunihiro Tanabe and Mr. Masahiro Ueda, General Manager of Mitsui Canada's Western division participated in the event. It also offered a place for students and Japanese language instructors from seven universities: University of Alberta, University of Calgary, University of Lethbridge, Mount Royal University, MacEwan University, University of Regina, and University of Saskatchewan. Participants presented excellent Japanese speeches that were highly praised by the audience.

March 11, 2017: Fukushima Nuclear Disaster Anniversary Event: Documentary by Director Ian Thomas Ash

In collaboration with the Japanese Research Centre at the University of British Columbia, PTJC hosted filmmaker Ian Thomas Ash at the University of Alberta. He presented his new documentary film, based on his oral history projects. After the film show, Mr. Ash opened the floor for discussion, asking how to improve the film. His presentation brought together scholars and students from different departments as well as the general public.

March 13, 2017: Kakehashi Project

PTJC welcomed participants in the Kakehashi Project – a Japan-Canada student exchange program organized by the government of Japan and facilitated by the Asia Pacific Foundation of Canada – to the University of Alberta. About 20 students, 2 high school teachers, and two APF staff participated in the event. Professor Olenka Bilash (Faculty of Education), Professor Christopher Lupke (Chair of the Department of East Asian Studies), and Professor Taka Masuda (Department of Psychology) joined a seminar style talk with them, explaining the benefits of studying at the University of Alberta.

March 29, 2017: Seminar on the history of Japan-China Relations

In conjunction with L. H. Thomas Annual Lecture with the Department of History and Classics, PTJC organized a seminar by Professor Joshua Fogel, York University. He exchanged ideas with our Asianists on campus. This event brought major Asianists from the Department of History and Classics, Department of East Asian Studies, Department of Fine Arts, Department of Modern Languages and Cultural Studies and the China Institute on campus together, highlighting the strength of the field.

May 16-June 16, 2017: Ritsumeikan Summer Program

Eleven students were selected to attend this year's Ritsumeikan Summer Japanese Program, which took place in Kyoto in Japan. PTJC offered four scholarships this year to qualified participants with high GPAs. These students participated in a language course, field trips, and Japanese cultural classes.
