**Gordon Weetman** has been a Professor of Silviculture at the University of British Columbia's Faculty of Forestry since 1978. Prior to that time, he held the same position at the University of New Brunswick (1971 – 1978) and worked for Pulp and Paper Research Institute of Canada, Montreal as a silviculture research scientist (1955 – 1971). Gordon studied forestry at the University of Toronto (B.Sc.F. 1955) and Yale (M.F. 1958, Ph.D. 1962). He has studied forest fertilization and forest nutrition for many years.

He is past president of the Canadian Institute of Forestry and former editor of the Canadian Institute of Forestry's "Forestry Chronicle". He has been on the ABCPF Council since 1994, on the Board of Examiners. He has been involved with the Silviculture Institute of British Columbia for many years as instructor, module leader, Curriculum Committee member, and member of the Board of Directors. Gordon teaches at the Alberta Advanced Forest Management Institute Modules in Hinton, Alberta. In 1997 he occupied the FRBC Chair in Silviculture at UBC, and in 1998 was given the FRBC Award of Excellence and the Association of BC Professional Foresters Distinguished Forester Award.

He has traveled widely in Europe and North America and is familiar with forestry and silviculture practices across Canada. He has studied the effects of clearcutting and harvesting practices in a variety of Canadian forest ecosystems for the past 30 years.
