I could not pre-register, I had to complete a placement test upon my arrival. Based on those results they put me directly into the appropriate classes.

I took 2 intensive Spanish classes over the 4week term: Level 4 grammar and Level 4 conversation

Please describe the credit and grading system at your host institution.

At the Universidad Autónoma de Guadalajara one class is 40 hrs of course and is equal to 2 credits. Their gradings system for the intensive Spanish courses is purely percentage based.

How was your overall academic experience (e.g. teaching style, class structure and sizes, amount of coursework, assessment) in comparison to your home institution?

Seeing as it was a summer program, I do not find it comparable to my studies at my host institution. The class sizes varied but I had only 5 people in each of my classes which allowed for lots of interaction and one-on-one time. The teaching styles were pretty typical for second-language classes. The assessments were fair and generally objective and the amount of coursework was extremely manageable. As a summer course abroad it gave ample time to explore the new culture and environment. There was 3.5 hourso of class per day and I would say there was approximately 40 minutes of homework each day to go along with that.

How did you obtain a transcript for coursework completed at your host institution?

I have yet to receive a paper copy of my transcript from UAG, but it is apparently in the mail. I was required to do nothing to have a transcript sent directly to my goabroad coordinator here at the UofA from the Intercambio office at UAG. That system is already in place. So I walked away from the host institution with nothing and it was dealt with after the fact (once my grades were finalized).

Lots of facilities were available at UAG. They had campus wide Wi-Fi and computers for student use in the library. The library also has lots of study space although the summer students do no have the ability to check out books. They have an excellent bookstore with course books as well as Spanish novels. They apparently have a free medical center for the students but I never visited it. They also have a comprehensive gym facility and offer free dance classes to students.

People dress much more conservatively there than here (even in the hot weather). What I found most annoying/challenging was the catcalls. They happen everywhere in Mexico no matter where you go or what you wear. Be prepared for that.

I loved the food! Definitely got to try new things and found some new favourites.
