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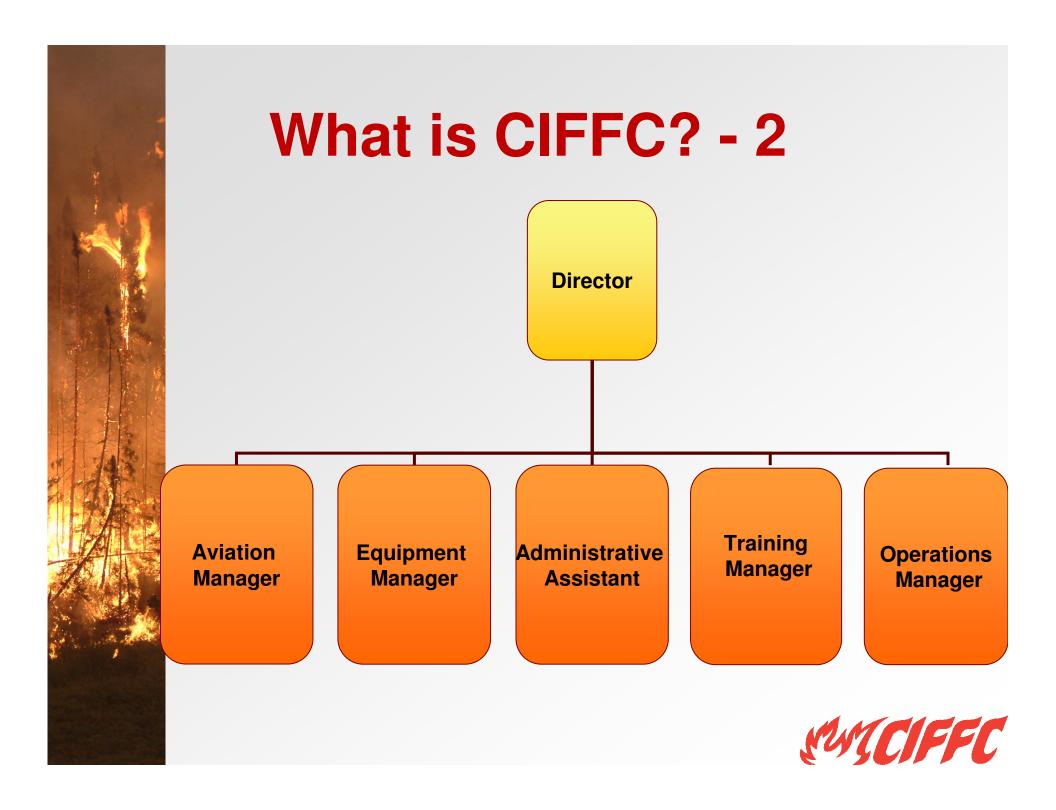




#### What is CIFFC?

  - Community of Practice (4)







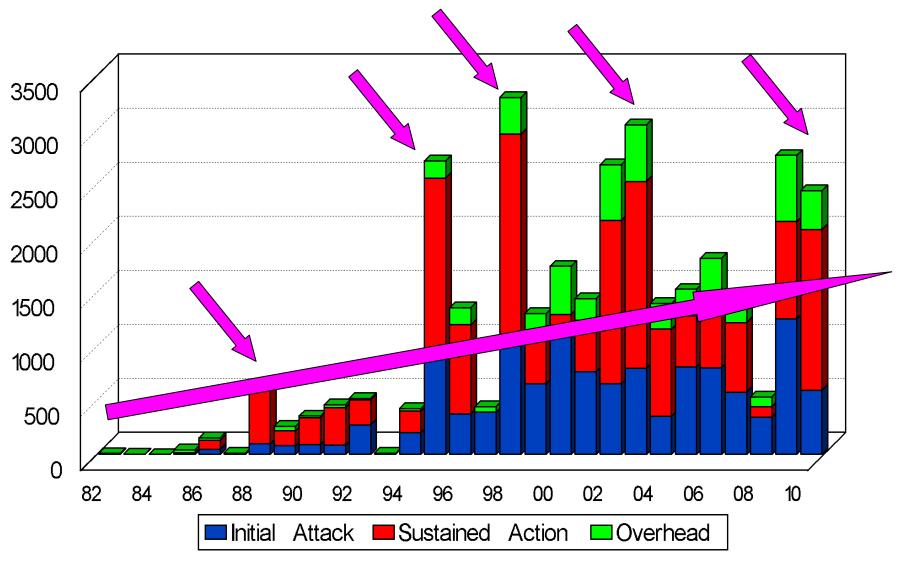
## Resource Sharing

- Primary Mandate: to broker resource sharing on behalf of the member agencies
  - Personnel
  - Equipment
  - Aircraft
- Single phone call to CIFFC
- Each member agencies resources are known daily
- US availability is known daily

#### Challenges to Resource Sharing

- Increase of "extreme" events
- Extended fire seasons
- Shrinking agency equipment stocks
- Increasing costs of importing resources
- Standards for exchange
- Multiple agencies with escalated activity
- Trained personnel availability
