- Case of fire crews fighting against same fire. Carroll, Cohn et al., 2004.




### 2010's fire in Quebec

 Dry spring + lightening → lots of wildfires early in the season


• Ex: May 25th, 2010

Algonquian language group


Nitaskinan, Mauricie, Québec

Identity = territory

### Nitaskinan



# Methodology

- Study of the social-ecological system (Berkes, Colding & Folke, 2003)
- Review of the literature in anthropology and resource management.
- Review of the media
- Semi-directive interviews (24) with individuals from different groups affected by the fire. From may to july 2011.

 Collaboration between atikamekw and non-atikamekw volunteers

Dialogue

Understanding



## **Emergency committees**

 Emergency committee of La Tuque at one end of the town / emergency committee of Wemotaci at the other end.

No communication.

Both efficient.



# Firefighters vs Fire Warriors

 About 100 atikamekw stayed to fight the fire → Fire Warriors (« Guerriers du feu »)

 When SOPFEU 's firefighters arrived, fire was already near the village

## Firefighters vs Fire Warriors

1/ Two groups working, no communication

2/ A leader to represent the Fire Warriors

→ Sopfeu transmits instructions, each group works on its side

3/ Conflict

→ Village saved, no injury, no death.



# Collaboration between indigenous and non-indigenous people

 Common problems in collaboration between indigenous and non-indigenous people :

Different world views, different ways of knowing

 Inequality in power distribution, framework provided by the ruling system, hegemony of science



# What's interesting about this case study?

2 types of « collaboration ».

 Communication before emergency and work with each group on its side during emergency could be a solution.

 Use of common imaginary (Goldstein & Butler, 2009 and Taylor, 2004).
